News from Denmark:

Blue Summer

The Danish Scout Association, called the blue scouts (because of the colour of their uniforms) held their National Jamboree in July, 2009.

It is called "Blue Summer" and is a quinquennial event taking part in the Southern Part of Jutland. This year 16,000 scouts together with 2,000 helpers participated in this jamboree, which had the headline of "Climate".

A championship was held in the discipline of Blue Energy and imagination was vividly displayed.

Many inventions were seen all over the camp in the effort of saving energy: For instance, it was possible to charge your mobile phone by means of pedalling on a bicycle; solar cells were used for heating up water, which was later used for washing up or even for taking a bath.

Many different ways of energy saving were displayed in a variety of stoves - The scouts had really grasped the idea of how to save fuel and at the same time to be good to the environment.



In the helpers' cafeteria old/used chinaware had been bought and a common dishwasher, daily washing or reuse of kitchen uniforms, rags, etc. instead of handing out new items every day (which is required by the food supply inspection authorities).

Many fellowship members were active with selling various items in the kiosks, helping out in the cafeterias or with the toilets, carrying out safety measures or were active as hosts for foreign Participants and many fellowship members very much enjoy being together with all the happy children and young people.

And of course we did succeed in having 1000 kites flying!

News from Norway:

It has been an active summer and autumn for the St George Guilds in Norway. In June the Landsgildeting (annual conference) was held between the sea and the mountains in the jazz city of Molde. A highlight was an evening service in the cathedral with music by young jazz musicians. We had the pleasure of welcoming two new guilds into our fellowship and electing two new members to the national guild leadership. One of them is a member of "Scoutriders" an mc club for scout leaders and guild members. It will be interesting to see whether more guild members turn up at our meetings on Harley Davidson's!

On the next weekend, a group from different parts of the country went to the Nordic-Baltic meeting on Åland, and the reports from there are good.

On 4th-11th July the Norwegian Scout Association held its national jamboree at Åndalsnes, also between the sea and the high mountains.



The guilds were there, highly visible in the centre of the camp, with St George's Hotel, with tents where guests were provided with a camp bed, washing facilities and a "lounge" under a tarpaulin. The "rooms" were named after the mountains surrounding the camp, and the hotel director and staffs was good-humoured members of St George guilds. We were also



responsible for an "inn" for scout leaders with plain food and the possibility of charging mobile phones. The hotel guests had all their meals served in the inn.

We continue to work on our strategy plan and aims for growth. In the districts, work continues on building networks, inspired by our programme Gnisten (the spark).

In November there was an inspiration and working weekend where the guild leadership invited all members of our committees. The purpose of the gathering was to increase awareness of the aims we are working for and the means we are using. We must work as a team. At the end of the gathering we made a list of suggestions for action. This has been sent to the leadership, who will decide priorities and time plans for the activities.

In September, guilds in Oslo helped to run an international event Overture. The Norwegian Scout Association was the arranger, and participants were scout leaders from the whole of Europe who are involved in including ethnic minorities and children with reduced functionality. There have been Overture gatherings several places in Europe, and now it was Oslo's turn. Crown princess Mette-Marit took part in the opening ceremony, and she praised the scout movement for encouraging curiosity and tolerance.

In Advent, the guilds help to spread the flame from the Church of the

Nativity in Bethlehem as a symbol of peace.
